One hundred years of firefighting in Port Washington

In 1892, Port Washington was growing rapidly. With this growth came the increased threat of fire. The Atlantic Hook & Ladder Company was the sole company in town at the time. Twenty-three individuals decided a second fire company was needed, and on April 5, 1892, the Port Washington Protection Fire Engine Company No. 1 was granted a charter. The library will present highlights of their history in the form of photographs, equipment and memorabilia in an exhibit scheduled for the Main Gallery this month.

The centerpiece of the exhibit will be the original fire pumper the

company purchased in 1892 from Rumsey & Company. Housed in the Firemen's Home Museum in Hudson, N.Y. since 1958, the pumper was brought back this year for the company's centennial celebration. The piano box engine and hose cart was first housed in the Lieber barn on Second Avenue, and was hand drawn to most fires by company members, and sometimes their wives. The last time it was used was at the devastating Stationary and Marine Motor and Supply Company fire in January 1914. Located next to the Port Washington Yacht Club, the blaze was fought by place

ing the pumper's suction line through holes chopped in the 18-inch-thick ice of Manhasset Bay.

Theirs are familiar Port Washington names, that, along with many others continue in the community and in the company.
